Providing personal care, including lifting techniques

Additional/alternative modules may be available in select Relias libraries

Promoting positive behavior and implementing appropriate behavior support techniques

Determining if a crisis situation is imminent and intervene using appropriate resources

Understanding and monitoring cases involving child abuse and neglect, including sexual abuse

Understanding and monitoring cases involving domestic violence

Understanding and monitoring cases involving mental health issues and/or substance use conditions

Understanding what children of different ages and developmental stages may need during supervised contact, and how they may respond to services

Understanding positive parenting skills and behaviors

Understanding how separation and divorce may affect the way children and parents respond during supervised visitation

Understanding the grief and loss associated with the removal of a child from the home

Understanding the social service systems with which families are likely to come into contact, including child welfare, law enforcement, and the courts

Understanding relevant laws and regulations, including those related to visitation and exchange, child protection, family violence, and custody

Appropriately documenting visits and exchanges

Establishing a strong bond with service recipients

Understanding child development and individual and family functioning

Mobilizing individual and family strengths

Recognizing and working with individuals with co-occurring health, mental health, and substance use conditions

Understanding psychosocial and ecological or person-in-environment perspectives

Determining when to involve a psychiatrist

Service Standards - Supervised Visitation and Exchange Services (SVE)

SVE 2.05

Personnel managing the supervised visitation and exchange program are trained on, or demonstrate competency in:

Receiving referrals and conducting intake and orientation;
Establishing conditions for service participation and fees for service;
Setting up physical space to promote safety;
Managing and reviewing cases;
Suspending or terminating services;
Collaborating with the court and other referring agencies; and
Testifying in court

Service Standards - Supervised Visitation and Exchange Services (SVE)

SVF 2.08

Within 12 months of hire personnel are trained according to the following requirements:

- 24 hours for personnel who supervise visits;
- 16 hours for personnel who only supervise exchanges;
- 40 hours for personnel who supervise off-site visits or exchanges; and
- 40 hours for personnel who manage the program.

Addressing and reducing stress, anxiety, secondary traumatic stress, and vicarious trauma

Creating an atmosphere of problem-solving and learning

Offering constructive ways to approach difficult situations with children and their sponsors

Facilitating regular feedback, growth opportunities, and a structure for ongoing communication and collaboration

Service Standards - Unaccompanied Children Services (UC)

UC 2.07

Direct service personnel receive ongoing training and education on:

Physical, behavioral, and emotional signs of sexual abuse and methods of preventing and responding to such occurrences

Existing resources for unaccompanied children and accessing services

Applicable laws and regulations pertaining to the care of unaccompanied children, including:

- (1) The Flores Settlement Agreement
- (2) The Trafficking Victims Protection Reauthorization (TVPRA) of 2008
- (3) The Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) of 2003

Additional training to address specific types of activities and to maintain certification in specific areas, as appropriate to individual responsibilities
